

Where can I find a place to fish?

There are nearly 70 public saltwater fishing access sites along Georgia's coast. You can search for them all—and find out whether amenities like tackle shops and restaurants are nearby—through the **Marine Recreational Information Program Site Register.** This free online database plays an important role in determining where and when field interviewers survey anglers.
